
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A Message From Leadership

Over the past few years, we worked together to strengthen Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe College:

We launched two bachelors degree programs in Business and Human Services, have applied for an additional bachelors degree in Teacher Education, and are piloting masters degrees in Business and Human Services.

We changed our name from Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwa Community College to Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe College.

We established new scholarships and were able to increase the award amount on our Student Scholarship Fund.

We invested in our technology infrastructure to improve the student experience.

We established a new strategic plan to take us through 2024, identifying areas such as meeting the needs of the communities we serve, employee development, service to students and alumni, academic offerings, and increasing capacity.

Additionally, we completed a master facility plan and are now implementing that plan in upgrades to our current facilities as well as the development of a new main campus.

Our College strives to be a premier organization focused on academic quality, community engagement and service, and the preservation of Ojibwe cultural teachings and knowledge.

In May of 2020 Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe College's pilot bachelor degree programs in Business and Human Services were approved.


The headcount at all five locations is up from the previous year, we are currently on pace to double our 2019-2020 headcount for the 2021-2022 academic year.


How is Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe College different from other college options?
